Environmental Health Justice (Fall 2015)

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course surveys philosophical theories of justice, applying them to population bioethics with particular focus on environmental health justice. Case studies will include environmental racism and injustice in the United States as well as environmental and global justice dimensions of climate change, food systems, pollution, and infectious disease.

Objectives:

- Gain familiarity with philosophical theories of justice and the contemporary literature on justice in healthcare and environmental justice.
- Critical analysis of issues of distribution regarding environmental and medical benefits/burdens.
- Apply theories of justice to particular issues in environmental health justice.
- Improve academic writing abilities.
